
BASKETBALL SEASON SUCCESS






ATLANTA HIGH SCHOOL BAND DIRECTOR



Out of the Senior class Joyce Youngblood, June Pinckard, Mary Sue Johnson and Billie Jo McCoy were chosen; out of the Junior class Jean Blair, Sally Talley and Jackie Aken; out of the Sophomore class La Juan McAdams and Mary Joyce Bedgood; out of the Freshman class Frances Brown and Biddy Cook.

The eleven girls started to work that afternoon having rummage sales, selling candy, popcorn balls and practically everything. Each class Each class backed its candidate by giving a benefit play in the auditorium.

On November 5, the girls counted their votes with Joyce having 11,042 votes, June 200 votes, Billie Jo 3,000 votes, Mary Sue 739 votes, Jean 7,413 votes, Sally 3,380 votes, Jackie 3,120 votes, Mary Joyce 1,811 votes, La Juan 11,036 votes, Frances 4,500 votes, and Biddy 9,375 votes, thus leaving Joyce, Jean, Biddy and La Juan in the race.

The four girls went to the office with their campaign managers and counted their votes. Joyce Youngblood had 47,751 votes, Biddy Cook 20,475 votes, La Juan McAdams 16,576 votes, and Jean Blair had 57.-945 votes, making Jean the Queen of the Atlanta Rabbits for 1945-46.

Carnival Queen's Race


