## Three Make It All The Way

QCHS students won five first place medals and placed in the top three 12 times en route to wining the district academic-literary mett over Daingerfield held March 29 at QCHS.
Journalism students led the QC charge as they racked up 80 of QC's 135 total points.

This was the best UIL season we've had in the six years I've been teaching," journalism advisor Jean Stow said.

The UIL season then continued two weeks after district as nine students traveled to Commerce for the region meet. John Bridges, Jeff Griffin and Laura Nickerson then won the right to advance to state competition by placing in the top three in their respective region contests. Kippie Barnwell placed in a tie for third in the accounting contest, but since this event was a pilot program, no state level competition was held.

At the state meet held April 27, in Austin, Griffin placed fourth in headline writing and Bridges and Nickerson placed fifth in editorial and news writing, respectively.
"This is the first time we've had three state winners in journalism," Stow said, "and I'm extremely pleased about that."

## Bark Wins Statewide ILPC Honors

Queen City High School journalists brought home two statewide awards in addition to four other awards from the 57th Interscholastic League Press Conference held March 16-17 in Austin.

Their weekly school newspaper, the Bulldog Bark, which is published every Sunday in the Citizens Journal, won "Tops in Division." This means the Bark was rated better than any other high school newspaper which is published in a local paper.
"Tops in Divison is what we've been shooting for all year," journalism advisor Jean Stow said.

The Bark also received an award of Distinguished Merit, the highest rating a high school paper can receive. Only three other papers in the "local paper" division received this distinction, and this is the fourth consecutive year that the Bark has been given this rating.

Individually, Bark staffers won three awards, and the QCHS yearbook staff won one.
Bark editor John Bridges took first place in the spot news photo category among 3-A schools, and then was awarded Tops in Texas for the same photograph. Tops in Texas means this photo was the best spot news photo in the state, regardless of school size.

This was the only Tops in Texas award won by a 3-A school. The other top awards went to 4.A and 5-A schools.

Bridges and fellow staffer Laura Nickerson teamed up to win third place in the in-depth news-feature category among 3-A schools. Then the yearbook staff took a second place award in advertising for the Citizens Journal's ad in the 1983 QC Bulldog yearbook.

## Business Department Grows to Fit Needs

With the addition of two Commodore CB word processors, the business department expanded to meet even more of the students needs.

Primarily using the new learning aids were members of Roberta Hagan's Vocational Office Education I and II classes.
In addition to her VOE courses, Hagen also instructs two typing and two accounting courses as well as serving as the head of the business department.
Her VOE classes also make up the membership of the local Office Education Association chapter. To be admitted to OEA, the students must first be enrolled in VOE classes.
In VOE students are prepared for entry level office jobs. Students work on improving their typing skills, and they learn to operate calculators, transcribing machines, stencil duplicators, electronic typewriters, and this year, word processors.

Accounting students learn the complete accounting cycle from recording the opening entry to the preparation of the financial statements at the end of the fiscal period.
In the two typing classes, students are taught the master key locations and learn correct typing techniques and how to type letters and manuscripts to improve their speed and number of errors.
In shorthand, which is taught by Lyn Farless, students learn the basics of shorthand in the first semester and try to master transcribing and build speed during the second semester.

## Eight Maths Taught

Many different math classes are taught at QCHS, both required and elective courses. Coach Lonny Hagan teaches Fundamentals of Math II, geometry, and Algebra I and II.

Linda Mills teaches FOM I, Introductory to Algebra, FOM II, and business math class, while Gary Upchurch teaches computer math.

FOM I and II are merely the basics of math that people use in everyday life.

Algebra I and II deal with basics of polynomial manipulation, and use of radicals as well as quadratic functions, while computer math introduces the student to the world of computers, with a short history of them and operation of Apple computers with programming in microsoft basics.

Geometry deals with the fundamentals of circles, proofs, equivalents, and many other methods to find the right angles to difficult problems in math.

Business math is a course that teaches the math required in businesses, much like accounting.

Studied in physical science are matter, atoms, molecules and forms of energy. Teaching these courses are Larry Parnell and Martin Bass.

## English Covers <br> Grammar, Novels

For graduation three years of English are required, along with English IV as an elective.
English I, taught by Debra Crawford, covers basic grammar, with spelling and vocabulary tests each week. Students are required to read six novels during the year. Literature, short stories, drama and poetry are covered. This year one of the dramas covered was "Romeo and Juliet". The students also worked on poetry notebooks along with keeping a journal.
English II, taught by Lyn Farless, is a class that stresses the fundamentals of grammar, the eight parts of speech and good sentence structure. A novel or book report is assigned each six weeks. "Julius Caesar," a film seen by the class, was one of the main dramas focused on this year, along with critical reviews given on biographies and autobiographies presented by each individual person.

Jacky Purtle, who teaches English III and IV, places emphasis on literature and grammar, along with novels. Research papers were written by both English III and IV students on a number of topics. English IV, while not required now, may be next year.
