Halfback

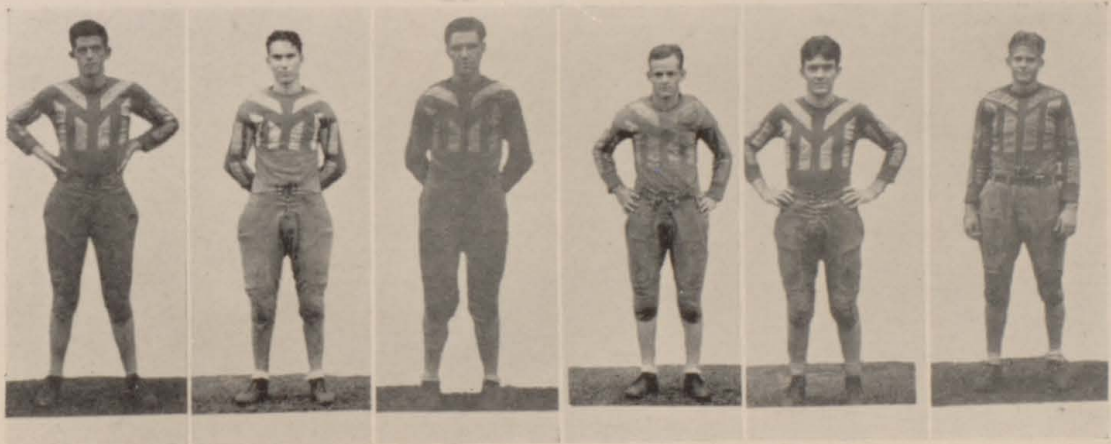

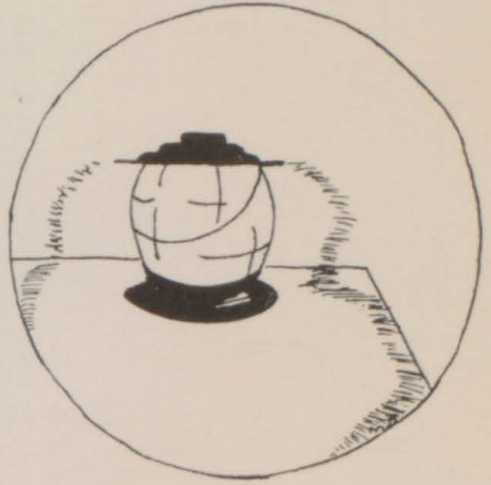
VI. This next game with Greenville resulted in the second straight conference defeat for the Tigers, 34-6. The game was played after a hard rain, and the blackest land also the

# WHY WE WANT AN ANNUAL

(Assembly Program)

The Class of 1909-1910 started a movement for a year book for our High school, but the opposition that confronted it was so strong that it was forced to abandon the idea. The "seed had been sown," however, in the minds of the Junior class of that year; and to the class of 1909-1910 is given the honor of originating this scheme to further the glory of Texas High School.

The real beginning of the history of our annual was in the early spring of 1911. It was a new idea in Texarkana, and very few people, besides the staff of editors, believed it other than a passing fancy of the class of 1911. Several members of the faculty even were opposed to a year-book for the High school, saying it was a too expensive luxury. The majority of them were in favor of the book, however, and their aid could not be easily over-rated.

When the Seniors were arranging for the publication of a High School Annual, the staff was besieged with questions as to why and wherefore of such a venture. The class answered the queries by saying that its object was two-fold.

In the first place, the annual was to be a memory book or souvenir for the outgoing classes, serving the purpose of the elaborate and much less complete, "graduate-books."

Names for the book had been suggested and discussed but it was not until April 18, 1911, that "The Half Shell" was suggested by some genius, who was too modest to reveal his identity. This was unanimously selected. While "The Half Shell" suggests the dual high school system of the city of Texarkana, the initial letters of the name are also the initial letters of "Texas High School."

With this fitting name to work upon, the staff immediately set to work, and in less than three months, on June 3, 1911, the first publication of a High School Annual in Texarkana, Texas-Arkansas, appeared.

The first two annuals, those of 1911 and 1912 had paper backs. Since it was so difficult to preserve these books, the progressive class of 1913 designed an annual with a pure leather back. The staff of '13 was so interested in the leather that it quite forgot the enormous cost. The debt was so large that only one more annual was allowed to be published for a number of years.

It was in the same year, 1913, that Arkansas published an annual called "The Better Half." Thus a new rivalry was created between the two schools.

No annual was published for four years, from 1914 to 1918. However, during this period of time a school pamphlet was written.

The class of 1918, after much difficulty, announced the publication of another annual. After many names had been suggested for the annual, the one, "Texas Tiger", was selected. This name was given to the new annual in honor of the athletic department of our school, which has always been called "Texas Tiger."

So from 1918 to the present day our High School Annual has been called "Texas Tiger."

The splendid books that have been issued from 1911 to this time, have been annuals that any High school might be proud to claim. The staffs of the past years deserve special mention here; they will never be ashamed of their publications—even in comparison with the coming edition of 1932.

I don't think you know who are working on

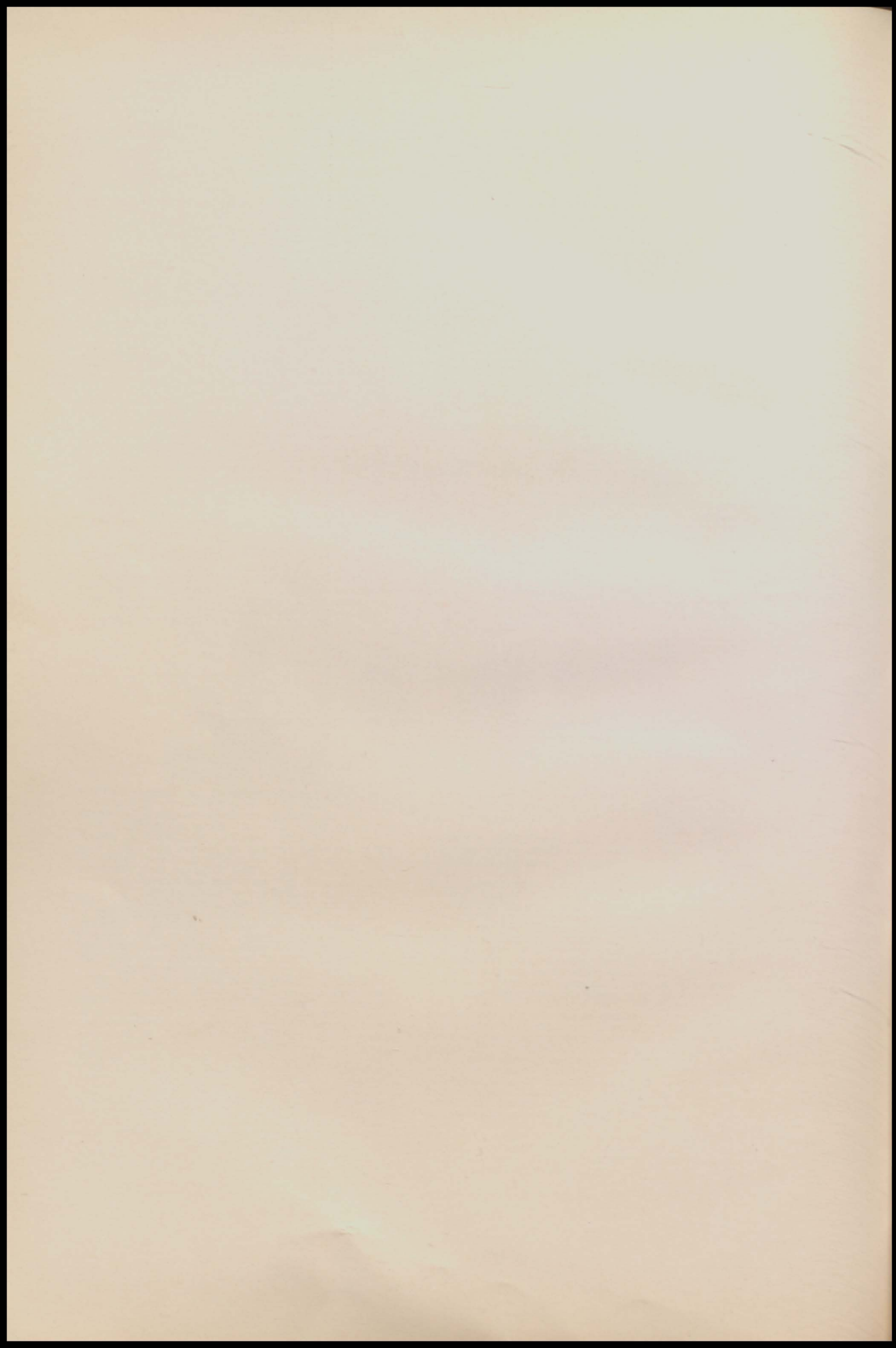
